Wellington, New Zealand, Feb 21/07 (47)
My Beloved Angel,
I wrote you last from Auckland also
to Arnold Harry & hope the letters have ar-
rived safely - shall be very glad to hear
from you all again in about 2 or 3 weeks
by which time I expect to reach Melbourne
D. S. My visit to Auckland was a very
happy one in every way through the tender
mercy & goodness of our gracious God -
the saints were very hearty & kind & were
refreshed in their spirits - it would have
taken 2 or 3 months to have visited them
all after the Colonial fashion - dear
Mr Jull drove me out to his farm & I spent
the night with them & was made very
comfortable - their love abounded in deed
- dear Mrs Jull & the children were all
so kind & they appear to like their new
life amid the bush - the dear lads work
away felling the trees & splitting up the
wood to make fences & other necessary
things - they have a capital idea of it
too - Mr J. invited in some of my neigh-
bouring farmers (Xians) to tea & afterward
we had a nice reading - it would have
amused you to see them leaving afterwards

in their carts to drive away across fields & gutties that would have frightened a person from the old country - we followed a long way with lanterns & you may judge of what sort of a climate it was that I carried a lighted candle a considerable distance & rest with it too. It is a lovely country & climate. - as for my business at Auckland, it eclipsed anything in Canada or America - seven names were given to me as first class reliable people & I did business with all of them - I expect I'd will be rather astonished when they receive the sheet. I left Auckland on Thursday last & dear Mr. Jull this wife & many others in fellowship kindly came down to the ship to see me off. We reached a nice little town called Napier on Saturday morn'g & remained there until the afternoon - I had written to a large firm there sending lists to & advising my proposed call during the steamers stay, so on landing in the launch I took the bus to them

warehouse with my case of samples & booked a splendid room for which I was indeed very thankful - saw a lot of the maories in the town & also met two young gentlemen from Philadelphia who came across the Pacific with us & are on a two years tour round the world - we arrived here on Sunday morning a little after 9 after a splendid passage from Auckland, keeping near the coast all the way - it is a much bolder coast than ours - such immense ranges of mountains towering one above another - the steamers are superbly fitted up with every conceivable comfort & was very full of passengers going to the different southern towns & also to Hobart & Melbourne - there was a great number of people on the wharf at Wellington on our arrival & the brethren at Auckland had written to say I purposed being with them, so I looked about among the crowd from our lofty upper deck & recognised Mr. Powley & some others with him who had kindly come -

return one of which is enclosed - I

writing in the Evening like a fly.

We had a nice meeting last night & dear
Mr. Souley sat again with me & have a
look at my samples which are all
spread out in a very comfortable little
room - I should never have believed
it possible that our biscuits would have
kept so well - the fact I am now
showing left Cardiff after the Railway
wreck so that they crossed the Atlantic
I were knocking about with me in
America for two months constantly
exposed - then a voyage through the
tropics & yet many of them are as
fresh & crisp to eat as when they left
the water. My business in New
Zealand will eclipse anything I did
in Canada & America - there is a
very large & first class firm of wholesale
merchants here who cover the whole of
New Zealand every month - called as
then yesterday morning I was well received

They afterwards came up & spent
about 2 hours looking over my
samples & were much pleased
with them & to my joy have decided
to take them up in real ^{earnest} interest
— they requested me to make out a
list of the kinds & quantities likely
to suit the market which I have
done — making up about a 2 or
3 hundred pound order, should they
confirm this it will be a grand affair
for A. & M. if I do nothing more in
the colonies. This is a beautiful
place such a grand & lovely harbour
— the great steamers can come in at
any time — the hills around are
simply magnificent & the climate
is so bright & refreshing. Purpose
moving on to Christchurch in a day
or two.

My order is confirmed with very little
alteration & a second one given to
follow a month or two after so as to
arrive here in November. The sails
are all very kind & I am out to tea
every evening somewhere, last night
at a brokers called Pottet recently
from Beckham — the night before at

kind love to Miss Wilkins.

love too & hope it will not be much
longer before I shall be able to express
it face to face — much love to yourself
